wenty years ago, our country, riding a wave of economic prosperity following the end of the Cold War, felt very much in charge of its destiny. That all changed on September 11, 2001, when terrorists flew planes into the Word Trade Center and the Pentagon, and a fourth plane - possibly headed for the White House - was brought down by heroic passengers in Pennsylvania before the hijackers could achieve their ultimate goal. Since then, we have fought two foreign wars, adapted domestic and foreign flying procedures, launched a new government agency in the form of the Department of Homeland Security, gone through the Great Recession, experienced an uneven economy ever since, and been immersed in a 24/7 news cycle that exploits our natural sense of alarm to keep us watching. Social media has enabled the spread of misinformation and the erosion of social norms, enabling anyone with two thumbs the ability to say the most inflammatory thing that they formerly would have had the sense to keep to themselves. Checking the news of the day is akin to asking for a damage report. A lot of news continues to be awful: COVID-19's delta variant; polarization in our country; Afghanistan; climate change and so on. It can be easy to feel overwhelmed by it all.

It is times such as ours where we must remember the view of the universe expressed in John 1:5, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." Also Romans 12:21, "Do not be overcome with evil, but overcome evil with good." Or, as Mister Rogers (a Presbyterian minister, by the way) put it, "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping."

As Christians we are called not only to look for the helpers but to be helpers ourselves. This year's "God's Work, Our Hands" commemoration, slated for September 12, is a timely opportunity to do just that, and Saint Paul's will do three things to strengthen one another and help our neighbors.

We will engage in some inreach to support those who are ill, convalescing, or homebound in our own community by taking time to write cards that will be mailed to those who would benefit from a kind and faithful word. We will also showcase an opportunity to assist a fellow Lutheran church that has partnered with a Catholic organization to provide hospitality and resources for Afghan refugees in the Rochester area. Meanwhile, we will resume collecting food for the local Food Pantry.

From parochial to local to regional and international, we will help one another and our neighbor as the hands and feet of Christ. In so doing, we will overcome being overwhelmed, and do what the church has done in even the darkest of times: reflect the light that shines in the darkness, and overcome evil with good.


